


BKS DIVERSITY, EQUITY AND INCLUSION

Accessing Report Cards on ASPEN

Step 1. Type in the address in your browser: aspen.quincypublicschools.com

Step 2. Your Login ID is your child's local student ID Number.

Your generic password is quincy123. You will be prompted to change your password after logging on. Your new password should be at least one UPPER CASE LETTER Quincy Public Schools and at least ONE NUMBER. Minimum of 6 digits. Login ID The password will be encrypted for security 12345678 reasons. The example is showing the encrypted password. Password I forgot my password Log On



Step 3. After logging on for the first time...You will be prompted to change your password. Your current password is quincy123. Type in your new password and then confirm the new password



Step 4. After logging on to Aspen, click on Set Preferences Tab up at the TOP right hand corner of the page. Click on the Security Tab. Enter your primary and alternate email address. Answer at least one of the security questions in the drop down menu. By answering the security question, if you forget your password it will be emailed back to you. Click on the link - I forgot my password at the log in screen.

After Logging on you will see PUBLISHED REPORTS on the right hand side of the screen. This is where the link will be located for the student's report card. After double clicking on the link you will be able to view the report card.

St Patrick's Day

Bring out your green! St. Patrick's Day—observed every March 17—is packed with parades, good luck charms, and all things green. The event started as a religious holiday, but over time it's become a celebration of Irish culture.

CELEBRATED SAINT

St. Patrick might be the patron saint of Ireland—but he didn't always *live* in Ireland. Patrick was born in Britain in the fourth century and didn't arrive in Ireland until he was 16 years old, when he was sent to work in the country.

After he arrived, Patrick became interested in Christianity and started teaching others about the religion. He is said to have converted many of the country's residents to Christians, and now St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on the day Patrick supposedly died.

MYTHS BUSTED

St. Patrick was a real person, but some of the traditions associated with him and the holiday are actually myths. For instance, you'll often see the four-leaf clover on St. Patrick's Day. However, according to legend, Patrick used a *three-leaf* clover, or shamrock, as part of his teachings. Even though it's possible for a shamrock to grow a fourth leaf, a four-leaf clover is just considered a symbol of good luck.

Another legend says that Patrick chased all the <u>snakes</u> out of Ireland. The problem? These creatures never actually lived in the country. In fact many animals found throughout Europe and North America don't live on the island of Ireland—the ocean keeps the critters away.

GOING GREEN

The fact that Ireland is an island—as well as green with leafy trees and grassy hills—means that the nation is sometimes called the Emerald Isle. But the color that people originally associated with St. Patrick was blue! (Some ancient Irish flags even sport this color.) Green was finally introduced to St. Patrick's Day festivities in the 18th century, when the shamrock (which is, of course, green) became a national symbol. Because of the shamrock's popularity and Ireland's landscape, the color stuck to the holiday.

Green is also the color that mythical fairies called leprechauns like to dress in—today, at least. But tales about leprechauns date back to *before* green was in: The fairies were first described as wearing red.

Women's History Month is a dedicated month to reflect on the often-overlooked contributions of women to United States history. From <u>Abigail Adams</u> to <u>Susan B.</u>

<u>Anthony</u>, <u>Sojourner Truth</u> to <u>Rosa Parks</u>, the <u>timeline of women's history milestones</u> stretches back to the founding of the United States.

The actual celebration of <u>Women's History Month</u> grew out of a weeklong celebration of women's contributions to culture, history and society organized by the school district of Sonoma, <u>California</u>, in 1978. Presentations were given at dozens of schools, hundreds of students participated in a "Real Woman" essay contest and a parade was held in downtown Santa Rosa.

A few years later, the idea had caught on within communities, school districts and organizations across the country. In 1980, President <u>Jimmy Carter</u> issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National <u>Women's History</u> Week. The U.S. Congress followed suit the next year, passing a resolution establishing a national celebration. Six years later, the National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the entire month of March.
